
Schematic: Five-Graf Essay

At its most basic level, an essay consists of these simple parts:

- an intro paragraph with a *thesis* stated at or near the end
- body paragraphs, each beginning with a topic sentence (TS)
- signpost and echo words in the topic sentence that tie it to the thesis
- a conclusion

Here is a brief schematic of the intro and body grafs at work:

Control Strip-Mining Now!




The thesis must be debatable and predict the body of the essay: in this case, the reader expects to read about a series of devastating "effects" of strip-mining in the paragraphs that follow.



Funnel Effect

Like a funnel, the intro paragraph must begin broad and gradually narrow your reader's focus down to the thesis statement—the intro's last sentence.



Signpost and Echo Words

The topic sentence should contain a **SIGNPOST** word or phrase (*first, second, in addition, another, an even more important effect*) and **ECHO** words that repeat or echo key words from the thesis.
